Even though there are free meals, we will need to have students log in for each meal they receive, just as they traditionally would.

*School has to file truancy with the county.

7 - 10 Excused Absences:

- *School to send a warning regarding excessive absences
- *Request for doctor's notes or nurse's assessment for any future absences due to illness

10+ Excused Absences:

- *School to impose Mandatory Doctor's Note or Nurse's Assessment requirement
- *Failure to produce a Doctor's note or Nurse's Assessment will result in an unexcused absence
- *If absences reach the threshold number, referral to the county.

Student Parking Passes: Students who are planning on parking on school grounds must do the following:

- 1. Have a signed (student & parent) parking contract turned in to Mrs. Wiener in the High School Office. Families/Students can pick up these forms from the high school office starting now.
- 2. Once the signed contract is turned in to the high school office, they will be issued a school parking permit which must be displayed at all times when parking on school grounds.
- 3. There is still no fee for parking on school grounds.

<u>Cell Phones:</u> A change in policy for Rush City High School means that students can no longer have their cell phones in classrooms during instruction. Students may use their cell phones only during passing times between classes, during lunch, or before and after school. See the student handbook for further details.

<u>Technology:</u> 1:1 Chromebook initiative continues to enhance the capabilities of our students and teachers. If your student is going to use a school device, please ensure the protection plan loan agreement paperwork is completed and returned to the office with payment of (\$45). Students are allowed to use their own devices.

Attendance and Tardies

The research is clear: Students who attend school regularly are able to learn more, have fewer discipline problems, develop better study habits, and often are more successful than students who do not. Our school district recognizes that good attendance is one of the keys to academic success. Good attendance includes arriving at school on time and being prepared to learn. Since truancy can be a symptom of more serious issues that a student may be facing, the Chisago County District Court, in collaboration with the Chisago County Attorney and Chisago County Health and Human Services, has developed a Protocol for Truancy/Educational Neglect cases.

Parents / Guardians will be notified when:

- A child has 3 unexcused absences the school will begin the initial interventions. Our schools are legally required to notify the parent or guardian that the child is a "continuing truant" at three unexcused absences. A letter outlining the potential legal consequences as well as recommended actions for the parents, is sent to the child's home.
- A child has 7 unexcused absences, they are considered "habitually truant." The school is required to report that the student is in violation of the compulsory attendance laws. The student must have a dated doctor's note for any further absences.
- A child has any further absences that do not have doctor's notes, they are referred to Chisago County or their county of residence for "Education Neglect".
- A child has excessive tardies. Any tardy beyond one hour counts as a half-day absence. These tardies quickly turn into full days of absences and are treated exactly the same as absences listed above.

Here are some tips for helping with attendance:

- Keep an attendance chart at home. At the end of the week, reward your child for attending school every day. Rewards could include a visit to the park, extra video game time or a special treat.
- Make sure your child is in bed by a certain time each night and the alarm clock is set.
- Don't let children stay home unless they are truly sick. Keep in mind complaints of a stomach ache or headache can be a sign of anxiety and may not be a reason to stay home. School is equipped to support and handle this.
- If your child seems anxious about going to school, talk to teachers, school counselors, or other parents for advice on how to make him/her feel comfortable and excited about learning. Our team approach has been successful!
- Talk to our health office staff if you have questions or concerns prior to keeping a child home from school.
- Identify a relative, friend or neighbor who can take your child to school if you can't or if he/she misses the bus.
- Avoid medical appointments and extended trips when school is in session. We do have a spring break scheduled for longer family vacations as well.

Procedures for Safety To And From School



Elementary Student Pick Up / Drop Off / Bus Loop / Parking

Morning Drop Off: In the morning, parents and guardians should drop students off along the sidewalk in the staff PARKING LOT area by pulling forward ALL THE WAY around the curve prior to stopping. This allows all cars to access the area. Students should be let out of vehicles and parents SHOULD NOT get out and walk students to the building. Staff will be there to assist students and to monitor for safety. Students may be dropped off between 7:45 and 7:59 a.m. before school and are allowed to go directly into school for breakfast or wait outdoors near the front entrance. If waiting outdoors, please make sure they have appropriate apparel for the seasons.

Students who are eating breakfast** or who are sitting with friends may go right in and head straight to the cafeteria after 7:45 a.m. Students who ride bikes to school should go to the back of the building to park bikes and walk to the front of the building to join the others. **One breakfast per student is FREE this year!

Afternoon Pickup: Afternoon pickup takes place in the front of the building in the bus loop. Students will be held safely inside the building until the buses are loaded and gone. Everyone must remain in their vehicles at all times during pick-up and must also use the bus loop, driving along the yellow curb to pick up students.

No one picking up a child can walk up to the building and wait. This is a VERY important part of our safety protocol. You will be asked to return to the pickup line if you decide to park somewhere and walk to pick up your child. Procedures must be followed for everyone's safety.

Any teacher may kindly correct any person not following the procedure. Students will be released to parents or guardians as they enter the bus loop in vehicles for pick-up. Every child is given a nameplate for the vehicles that will be picking them up. This can be picked up at your child's Get to Know You Days conference. The nameplate should be displayed on the dash or window of the vehicle or can be held up for staff to read. All students will load directly into vehicles from the CURBSIDE for their safety. Students cannot walk into the lane to get in a vehicle on the driver's side; no exceptions. Please plan accordingly as we know that many of you have car seats that may need to be moved. If everyone follows this procedure it will go very smoothly and quickly! Thank you in advance for helping us with a safe and swift dismissal!

It is not necessary or advised to arrive early to wait for a place in line—in fact, it complicates the process. If people arrive shortly around the time the buses leave (at 3 p.m.), the process will naturally go smoothly.





Bus Procedures

The bus loop in the front of the elementary is reserved for school buses or school vehicles only from 7:30 a.m. to 3:05 p.m. (immediately after buses leave). Staff will be monitoring students as they board or exit buses each day. Students who ride the bus will receive information about pickup and drop-off times a week prior to school. Any bus-related issues should be directed toward the Transportation Supervisor first. There will be no bus passes issued again this year for various safety and capacity reasons. If your child is having friends or guests over, please plan to pick them up after school.

Students are released from school as follows at the end of the day:

2:55 p.m. - Bus Riders (from the front of the building)

3:00 p.m. - Parent Pick Up (from the front of the building)

3:00 p.m. - Walkers and Bike Riders (from the rear of the building)

Parents and Guardians: Please remember to make any transportation changes for the day in writing to your child's classroom teacher or through a phone call to the elementary office prior to 2:00 p.m..

We are looking forward to a great start to the school year for Rush City Tigers activities! Again this fall, there are over 200 students involved in the activities they enjoy. There are many opportunities for families and community members to come out and watch games or events. For times and places of these games and events, check out the events and activities calendar.

Admission to home games will continue to be \$5 for adults and \$3 for students with ages 62+ attending for free. Those senior passes can be picked up at the high school office or at the admissions table during games. Again this year, all high school students get free admission with their school ID or their Student View account. Elementary students are also admitted free, but they must be accompanied by an adult chaperone.

Athletic contests bring out strong emotions in the people who coach and participate in them. They also bring out some of those same strong emotions in the fans who come to cheer the Tigers on. Fans at Rush City events in the past have shown good sportsmanship and control. However, if you ever see or hear anything that you feel is not appropriate at any of our events, home or away, please contact the Activities Director. Again, we have been very fortunate and appreciative of the fact that in Rush City we have not had many incidents where fans have made poor choices. This is not the typical trend across Minnesota and the rest of the country. Thank you for your continued sportsmanship.

Any students who are planning to participate in a sport should check to make sure that they are registered for that sport on the activity registration page. Students must also have a current physical on file in order to start practices on time. If you have any questions or need assistance, please reach out to the Activities Director or Cathy Monster.

Postponements and cancellations for games and practices can happen anytime. Parents, make sure to opt into the Remind 101 app that your child's coach provides. This is a great way to get messages about practice and bus departure changes on short notice. Grandpas, grandmas, and community members can stay informed about game schedule changes and notifications as well. Simply set up 'Notify Me' through the events & activities calendar on the district's homepage.

- 1. Set up an account using your email address and create a password.
- 2. Choose all of the activities you would like to be alerted to.
- 3. Setup Notification Preferences
 - a. You can choose to get notifications of the upcoming events in the activities you choose.
 - b. You can choose to get notifications only when a scheduled event is changed.
- 4. Click "Save My Settings" and you are finished.

You can change your 'Notify Me' settings anytime by logging back into your account, making the changes, and saving the changes you make.

Hey, I'm back!

Until we have a new school nurse, I've returned to manage the health office. I love being back with all the fabulous staff and kids, but it's only temporary.

With the start of the school year, I would like to put out some reminders.

- Remember that it is a state law that children are current on immunizations or have a current conscientious objection form on file. We check kindergarteners and 7th graders. Those kids who do not have current records on file cannot be in school, so please, please make sure to have their shots before school starts. Fairview clinics offer free immunizations to anyone.
- Please make sure emergency records are filled out and returned to the office promptly. We want to have the most current information on file in case we need to reach you.
- If your student takes medications at school you will need to come to school to sign paperwork and drop off medication.
- Please teach and encourage your children to wash their hands often, avoid sharing food and drinks, cover their cough, and avoid touching their faces.
- Please review the handbook on when to keep your child home from school.
- If your child has a health concern or one develops during the school year, please reach out to let me know and we can come up with a plan that will provide a safe learning environment for your child.

Oh, and guess what? There's an uptick in COVID-19. Fortunately, free tests are available. Minnesotans can order free rapid at-home COVID-19 tests. Every home in Minnesota can order eight tests once a month while supplies last. Even if you have ordered before, you can order again. Order your tests at Say Yes! To Covid Test (sayyeshometest.org).



ECFE (Early Childhood Family Education)

Early Childhood Screening

Screening questions and passing scores are based on the age of your child on the day they are screened. Screening is a quick check to be sure your child is meeting important developmental milestones. Welcome back to another school year.

I hope everyone has enjoyed their summer! Please be alert to school buses being on the road again and cautious for students waiting at bus stops.

Bus information for the 2023-2024 school year has been established based on transportation needs from the last school year and the information collected recently. If have not received a letter, this means our records indicate that you do not need district transportation services. If you do require transportation or need to make a change to the information you received, please complete a 23-24 student transportation form and return it to your child's school office or the email at the bottom of the form. We ask that you allow up to five days for requests to be processed. Please understand that it is critical that we have consistent and accurate information on the location of all riders at any given time. This is why all students are required to ride the bus they are assigned to, as well as get on and off at their designated stop location. For the safety of all, we do not allow students (families) to alter these plans. Thank you for understanding that we cannot honor requests for bus passes. If your child cannot ride their scheduled bus, it will be the responsibility of the parent/guardian to arrange transportation. Students will be assigned to one primary bus and we ask that they ride only that bus. In rare circumstances, a student may also be assigned to an alternate bus (daycare, grandma's, etc.) only if they use this alternate site on a regular schedule. It is imperative that we adhere to these guidelines.

Safety Expectations on the Bus - Students will be notified of bus rules and will be expected to conduct themselves in a manner that will ensure safe passage and good care of the buses. Our primary concern is to provide the safest transportation possible. When a child becomes unruly on a bus, the child could be endangering others. Students who do not maintain an acceptable level of responsibility on the bus may lose the privilege to ride. Parents will be notified when a child exhibits repeated unacceptable behavior.

Disclaimer - Bus Transportation - Parents are advised that by Minnesota Law, school buses carry essentially the same insurance coverage as private automobiles, therefore, the "no-fault" coverage is in effect. Should a passenger in a school bus be injured, that passenger must make a claim to her or his (parent's) automobile insurance carrier for medical coverage.

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND **GUARDIANS**

Our school has adopted The "I Love U Guys" Foundation's Standard Response Protocol (SRP). Students and staff will be training, practicing, and drilling the protocol.

COMMON LANGUAGE

The Standard Response Protocol (SRP) is based on an allhazards approach as opposed to individual scenarios. Like the Incident Command System (ICS), SRP utilizes clear common language while allowing for flexibility in protocol.

The premise is simple - there are five specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive." Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff, teachers and first responders. The SRP is based on the following actions: Hold, Secure, Lockdown, Evacuate, and Shelter.

HOLD

"In Your Classroom or Area"

Students are trained to:

- Clear the hallways and remain in their area or room until the "All Clear" is announced
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Close and lock the door
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"

Students are trained to:

- Return to inside of building
- Do business as usual

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring everyone indoors
- Lock the outside doors
- Increase situational awareness
- Account for students and adults
- Do business as usual



LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

Students are trained to:

- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Recover students from hallway if possible
- Lock the classroom door
- Turn out the lights
- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door
- Prepare to evade or defend

"To a Location"

Students are trained to:

- Leave stuff behind if required to
- If possible, bring their phone
- Follow instructions

Adults and staff are trained to:

- Bring roll sheet and Go Bag (unless instructed not to bring anything with them, dependent on reason for evacuation.)
- Lead students to Evacuation location
- Account for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.

SHELIER

"State Hazard and Safety Strategy"

Hazards might include:

- Tornado
- Hazmat
- Earthquake
- Tsunami

Safety Strategies might include:

- Evacuate to shelter area
- Seal the room
- Drop, cover and hold
- Get to high ground

Students are trained in:

Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies

Adults and staff are trained in:

- Appropriate Hazards and Safety Strategies
- Accounting for students and adults
- Report injuries or problems using Red Card/Green Card method.







PARENT GUIDANCE

In the event of a live incident, parents may have questions about their role.

SECURE

"Get Inside. Lock outside doors"



Secure is called when there is something dangerous outside of the building. Students and staff are brought into the building and the outside doors will be locked. The school might display the Building is Secured poster on entry doors or nearby windows. Inside, it will be business as usual.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A SECURE EVENT?

Probably not. Every effort is made to conduct classes as normal during a secure event. Additionally, parents may be asked to stay outside during a Secure event.

WHAT IF PARENTS NEED TO PICK UP THEIR STUDENT?

Depending on the situation, it may not be safe to release the student. As the situation evolves, Secure might change to a Monitored Entry and/or Controlled Release.



WILL PARENTS BE NOTIFIED WHEN A SCHOOL GOES INTO SECURE?

When a secure event is brief or the hazard is non-violent, like a wild animal on the playground, there may not be a need to notify parents while the Secure is in place.

With longer or more dangerous events, the school should notify parents that the school has increased their security.

LOCKDOWN

"Locks, Lights, Out of Sight"

A Lockdown is called when there is something dangerous inside of the building. Students and staff are trained to enter or remain in a room that can be locked, and maintain silence.

A Lockdown is only initiated when there is an active threat inside or very close to the building.

SHOULD PARENTS COME TO THE SCHOOL DURING A LOCKDOWN?

The natural inclination for parents is to go to the school during a Lockdown. Understandable, but perhaps problematic. If there is a threat inside the building, law enforcement will be responding. It is unlikely that parents will be granted access to the building or even the campus. If parents are already in the school, they will be instructed to Lockdown as well

SHOULD PARENTS TEXT THEIR STUDENTS?

The school recognizes the importance of communication between parents and students during a Lockdown event. Parents should be aware though, during the initial period of a Lockdown, it may not be safe for students to text their parents. As the situation resolves, students may be asked to update their parents on a regular basis.

In some cases, students may be evacuated and transported off-site for a student-parent reunification.

WHAT ABOUT UNANNOUNCED DRILLS?

The school may conduct unscheduled drills, however it is highly discouraged to conduct one without announcing that it as a drill. That's called an unannounced drill and can cause undue concern and stress.

Parents should recognize that the school will always inform students that it is a drill during the initial announcement.



It's important to differentiate between a **drill** and an exercise. A drill is used to create the "Muscle Memory" associated with a practiced action. There is no simulation of an event; this is simply performing the action. An exercise simulates an actual event to test the capacity of personnel and equipment.

CAN PARENTS OBSERVE OR PARTICIPATE IN THE DRILLS?

The school welcomes parents who wish to observe or participate in drills.

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SchoolMessenger®

SchoolMessenger® is an automated communication and emergency notification system. As our district provides most of our communications electronically, it is imperative that we have accurate family contact information on file.

This system helps schools by empowering principals and administrators to notify parents using automated phone, email, and *text message (SMS) broadcasts. This can include scheduled communications, same-day and night-before parent notification for school cancellations, schedule changes, and unplanned events.

Parents/guardians are encouraged to log in to their ParentVue account to review the accuracy of their contact information and to make updates/corrections. Note that each parent has their own ParentVue account. Please ensure your email and phone contacts are current. SchoolMessenger® is set up to send broadcasts to all phone numbers and the first two emails you list in ParentVue.

Writing a Check to the School?

Attention!! If you are writing a check to the school for any reason, all written checks require the following:

- A printed or written phone number on the check

Checks will not be accepted if either of these items are incorrect or missing. If your check needs to be re-issued, credit will not apply until the correct check is received. Thanks for your understanding.

Student Accident Insurance

The School District does NOT provide any type of health or accident insurance for injuries incurred by your child at school.

We encourage all families to have accident coverage for their children prior to participation in any sports or school-sponsored activities. If you do not feel your insurance is adequate or do not have insurance, we encourage you to review the student insurance program.

Accident insurance is made available through Gerber Insurance. This plan will provide benefits for medical expenses incurred because of an accident. Enrollment can be completed by visiting K-12 Special Markets.

Students and parents must be sure to inform the coach or the person in charge of the activity if the student is injured. An accident form must be filled out and verified in each case at the time of the injury



Asbestos Notification

To all parents, teachers, and employee organizations of ISD #139:

ISD #139 has on file a complete and updated Management Plan for dealing with former asbestos-containing building materials within the school district's buildings. The Management Plan is available for viewing by interested parties, Monday through Friday; 8:00 a.m. through 3:00 p.m. at the District Office. Copies will be made available for reproduction at a nominal cost.

The Rush City High School was designed without specifying or requiring the use of asbestos-containing building materials. During the summer of 2003, C. E. Jacobson Elementary had all known asbestos-containing building materials removed. This included floor tile and pipe wrap contained within the interior walls.

Environmental Health Issue

The Lead Contamination Control Act of 1988 requires that all water coolers in public and private elementary and secondary school buildings that are not lead-free must be repaired, replaced, permanently removed, or rendered inoperable unless the water coolers are tested and found not to contribute lead to drinking water (test results above 20 parts per billion where a significant portion of the lead is contributed by the cooler). Although testing for lead is not required under the Act, it is encouraged.

Rush City schools routinely conduct tests on water coolers within its buildings to determine the lead content. By law, the school shall notify parents, teachers, and employee organizations of the availability of such testing results.

Testing results and a record of remedial action taken may be found at the district office and may be viewed during normal business hours.

Notice Concerning Use of Pest Control Materials:

Our district utilizes a licensed, professional pest control service firm for the prevention and control of rodents, insects, and other pests in and around the district's buildings. Their program consists of:

- 1. Inspection and monitoring to determine whether pests are present and whether any treatment is needed.
- 2. Recommendations for maintenance and sanitation to help eliminate pests without the need for pest control materials.
- 3. Utilization of non-chemical measures such as traps, caulking, and screening.
- 4. Application of EPA-registered pest control materials when needed.

Pests can sting, bite, cause contamination, damage property, and spread disease; therefore, we must prevent and control them. The long-term health effects on children from the application of such pest control materials, or the class of materials to which they belong, may not be fully understood. All pest control materials are chosen and applied according to label directions per Federal Law.

An estimated schedule of interior pest control inspections and possible treatments is available for review or copying at each school office. A similar estimated schedule is available for the application of herbicides and other materials to school grounds. Parents of students may request to receive, at their expense, prior notification of any application of pest control materials, should such an application be deemed necessary on a day different from the days specified in the schedule.

Rush City Schools Radon Testing

During the 2016-2017 school year, Rush City School buildings were tested for the presence of radon. All test results came back below the Minnesota Department of Health recommended limit.

Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) Notice

Rush City School district is proud to be taking a leadership role in providing a safe, comfortable, and productive environment for our students and staff so that we achieve our core mission - educating students. Our school will follow EPA guidance to improve our indoor air quality by preventing as many IAQ problems as possible, and by quickly responding to any IAQ problems that may arise. Good air quality requires an ongoing commitment by everyone in our school. School staff, students, and parents can obtain checklists or self-help information so they can properly evaluate their child's home or out-of-school situation by contacting the school. Staff and parents can also obtain information about school facility construction, maintenance, housekeeping practices, chemicals used, and mold herbicide applications to determine the extent to which activities contribute to a child's symptoms by contacting the school.



State Choice Programs - Open Doors for Minnesota Learners

Several choice programs have been adopted by the legislature since 1985.

Two pamphlets are available to help guide you in the selection of a school: "How to Pick Your Child's School" and "How to Select a School For Your Child: A Family Guide." Ask someone in your local school office or call the MN Dept. Education Hotline: 651-582-8572.

Families and learners may choose from the following enrollment options programs:

POST SECONDARY ENROLLMENT OPTIONS allows 11th and 12th graders to attend, full or part-time, a technical college, a community college, a private, liberal college or university, or any of the state universities for high school credit. Students must meet the requirements of that postsecondary institution. Students should work with their high school counselor to ensure the courses taken will meet graduation requirements.

SCHOOL DISTRICT ENROLLMENT OPTIONS OR OPEN ENROLLMENT permits kindergarten through twelfth-grade students to apply to attend a school outside the district in which they live. Applications must be received by the nonresident district for enrollment.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION INCENTIVES program is designed to encourage learners, who are having difficulty in school or who have dropped out of school, to complete their high school credits in alternative settings. Qualifying students may attend another traditional high school inside or outside their district, an Area learning center, an Alternative School or program, or a nonpublic, nonsectarian school that has been contracted by a district to provide educational service.

DIPLOMA OPPORTUNITIES FOR ADULTS encourages individuals aged 21 or older, who have not completed high school to return to get their diplomas. Qualifying persons have up to two years of free state aid to finish their requirements. Many of the same programs available under high School Graduation incentives are available to adults.

AREA LEARNING CENTERS provide year-round, nontraditional education toward a high school diploma for students 12 years of age through adult on a full- or part-time basis. Students develop, with an instructor, learning plans that best fit their course needs and learning styles.

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS personalize the education of learners at risk of not completing high school. classes are taught using nontraditional methods and allow for flexible scheduling. These programs operate during the school day and year.

EDUCATION PROGRAMS FOR MINOR PARENTS AND PREGNANT MINORS are designed to ensure teens, who are parents or pregnant, complete their high school education. When requested, educational programs that fit the needs of the individual must be made available, by the school district, along with any necessary supportive services.

Directory Information - Elementary and High School Students

In compliance with Section 99.3 of the Data Privacy Act, the Rush City Public Schools declares the following information relating to students to be "directory information": Student's name, address, telephone number, e-mail address, date and place of birth, participation in school activities, dates of attendance, school awards received, and other similar information. What this means is that the school will release upon request the above information regarding students to military recruiters, colleges, tech schools, congressmen, etc.

Students and parents have the right to refuse to permit the designation of any or all of the above categories of personally identifiable information as directory information with respect to that student. Students or parents wishing to do so should contact the elementary school or high school offices by September 25, 2023. Students will automatically be included in the directory information list if parents have not contacted the school.

Assurance of Compliance with State and Federal Law Prohibiting Discrimination

We hereby affirm that the Rush City School District Number 139 is in compliance with the following state and federal laws prohibiting discrimination:

The superintendent of schools is designated as the administrator of this program. Anyone feeling they have been discriminated against in any of these items should contact him/her to register a complaint.

Teacher Qualifications

We are required to notify parents of their rights to access information on the professional qualifications of classroom teachers:

- Whether the teacher is licensed for the grades/subjects assigned.
- Whether the teacher is teaching with a waiver.
- The academic preparation of the teacher and whether their child is provided services by a paraprofessional and his/her qualifications.
- Notify parents when students have been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who is not highly qualified.
